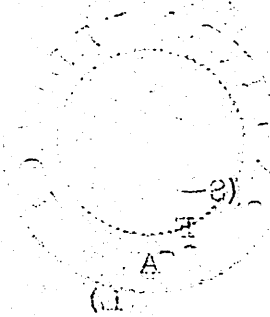

Advised by letter to inform the public of the availability of measles vaccine. Immunization clinics should be set up.

"In the interim, a redirection of federal funds has once again made measles vaccine available to state health departments. Although the amount is limited, the vaccine will be provided to county health departments by the State. Each county operates immunization clinics at which inoculations for certain diseases are provided without cost. Until the supply is exhausted, measles vaccine will also be provided. You should also be aware that a vaccine for rubella (German measles) is amply available. A pregnant woman contracting this disease incurs a substantial probability of fetal death, a stillbirth, or a physically defective child.

**Conf. of
Mayors:**

"In light of the needless incidence of these diseases, especially the resurgence of measles, your efforts to inform the residents of your community of the magnitude of this problem and its potential remedy would be valuable responses to these health hazards. Consequently, I urge you to contact officials of the health department in your county to determine what immunization programs are planned and to assist these officials by publicizing the county inoculation clinics."

**Storm Sew.
Complaint:**

William Zadorozny, 153 Stafford and Elden Elliott, 147 Stafford Street, advised the Village Board that silt, mud, and streams of water have infiltrated their back yards in the last two years, which in their opinion has been caused by the building of houses, road, digging sewers and water lines. They asked the board if it would be possible to put drainage tile down through this area to take care of this overflow. The board informed the gentlemen that they would attempt to use the transit to determine if it would be possible to excavate to the nearest manhole. In all probability, easements would be needed on all the properties in order to lay such a line.

Mrs. Virginia Daly, Hathaway Street commented that she had no complaints but wished to sit in on a board meeting.

Mrs. Agnes Griffith presented a brochure to the board that she had obtained which pictured various types of lights that might be suitable for placing on the front of the Village Hall. RESOLVED: Whereas the President of the United States, Richard M. Nixon, has decreed that all wages, prices shall be frozen as of August 15, 1971 for a period of 90 days,

BE IT RESOLVED: Whereas the Town of Palmyra purchases water from the Village of Palmyra per contract, which contract would expire on August 31, 1971, and whereas it is expedient that an agreement be reached,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the present contract be employed on a month-to-month basis until such time as the United States Gov't rules on this edict.

R. Jones Creek Bcd:

Robert K. Jones, 120 East Jackson, advised Trustee Alderman that during the last storm a tree in his yard was felled which straddled the creek bed in the back of his property. R. Jones commented that he would like to have permission to have a sluiceway over the creek bed. Trustee Alderman informed him that the creek was his responsibility and the village did not have any jurisdiction in the area. Attorney Nesbitt recounted again that any part of the creek that runs through one's property, belongs to him. The owner may cover but he cannot or should not restrict the flow of water.

Home Owner Respon. for Creek Sides:**C. Richardson:**

Charles Richardson, East Foster Street, expressed his appreciation for the new sluice-way in the area of his driveway adjoining the property of Henry Pieters. He also commented that he felt the village crews did a fine job in clean-up after the last windstorm of August 22nd.

Playgrd. Equip.:

Charles Richardson commented that the Jaycees would be available to set-up the new playground equipment on Saturday, September 11th and possibly Sunday, the 12th, if it was not completed the first day. Trustee Sinclair volunteered to arrange for the pieces of equipment to be taken down to the new cemetery play area so that it might be assembled.

Moose Club Sign:

Zoning Officer Wideman advised that the Moose Club's new electric sign is legal in accordance with the size allowed under the present zoning code in an R-2 area. Several complaints from residents living to the south of the Moose Club had been received by board members. All complaints seemed to stem from the fact that the bright glow of the sign in the night was not conducive to a residential area. Zoning Officer Wideman interjected that all non-conforming signs will have to be removed by 1972 and perhaps the matter will be appeased by then but in the meantime would check out the situation.

Junk Cars:

Zoning Officer Wideman informed the board that he was not unaware of the many unlicensed vehicles throughout the village. He has a proposed revision of the section pertaining to junk cars in the ordinance. The board agreed to review the proposal with him.

Zon. Ord. changes:

Zoning Officer Wideman mentioned to the board that he felt that there were several sections in the zoning ordinance that should be revised. The board suggested that he confer with the Planning Board, who in turn would make recommendations of changes to the Village Board for their passage, if practical after the necessary public hearings and legal technicalities.

Mar. Mid. Confers:

Mr. Charles Andrus and Mr. Harry White of the Marine Midland Bank discussed the P. T. Sexton and Cemetery Trust Fund accounts commenting that the bank provided investment advise, making suggestions, only, for the good of the fund. All the securities must be held in the safe deposit box in the local bank and cannot be entrusted to the Rochester Office of the bank for liquidation at their leisure, as in a private individual portfolio. Trustee Leysath commented that they, Marine Midland, are trustees of the two accounts (P.T. Sexton & Cemetery). Moreover, he added, the village board has new members each year,

Mar. Mid. Confers: consequently, the board feels that the bank should have a pertinent interest in the accounts. Trustee Green queried as to how often did the bank review the village funds. According to Mr. Andrus, from the main branch of the Marine Midland, the main bank in New York City has an analyst department which studies the financial trends of the country. They in turn inform the area banks of possible lucrative times to buy and sell. A formal review is made of the village accounts twice a year but daily they study the stock accounts. Mr. Andrus suggested that an annual visit might be in order during the month of May so that the board might be aware of the financial condition or trends that might be taken for keeping the accounts in a soluable state.

Staf. Hghts: Ease. Attorney Nesbitt read a letter which he had written to Mayor Nussbaumer relative to Lots #18 and #19 on West Jackson through which easements had been obtained for drainage tile. However, according to Attorney Nesbitt, houses were placed slightly on the easement, but would not interfere with the drainage. It was his suggestion that the board agree to a resolution and quit claims for execution by the Village. The following resolution or motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried:
RESOLVED: Whereas it appears that construction has begun for two houses on Lots #18 and 19 in the Stafford Heights project which will encroach on the easement of 30' granted to the Village of Palmyra for drainage purposes,
BE IT RESOLVED: That a change in the measurement be made from 30' to 24' so that clear title to the property can be arranged.

Weykman Bldg.: The board was informed by Attorney Nesbitt that if in 30 days the owners of the so-called Weykman Block at #305 East Main Street do not respond to the letters he has written, the matter may be taken to the Supreme Court for an order to allow for the demolition. Trustee Sinclair mentioned again that the building is a real hazard. The general feeling seemed to be that it would cost a minimum of \$10,000.00 to tear down, the main problem stemming from the fact that two other walls are involved. Clerk was asked to obtain estimates from J. Cleason and V. Sessler of Waterloo for a figure as to the cost of removing. Attorney Nesbitt commented that a "Show Cause Order" might be a possible solution for tearing down.

Radar Equip.: The police committee informed the board that the new radar equipment had arrived and would be put to use.

Truck Bids: The following motion was made by Trustee Alderman, 2nd by Trustee Sinclair and carried:
RESOLVED: Whereas the Village of Palmyra had asked for bids for a 3/4 ton pickup truck for the highway department, and, Whereas, three bids were obtained,
BE IT RESOLVED: That the bid price of \$2,872.00 by the Palmyra Motors be accepted for the reason that the International Truck bid in the amount of \$2,800.00 did not have the proper motor specs.

New Trk. for Hwy?: Trustee Alderman informed the board that before the winter months approach it would behoove the village to consider a purchase of a large truck which would cost approximately \$18,000.00. It was his feeling that the cost of this, should be spread over the water department budget also. At the present time, no funds have been allocated for the purchase of new equipment. It was his thought that emphasis should be placed on such a fund for the future, but presently, something would or should be done to alleviate a possible breakdown of the practically worn out equipment in the highway department.

Police Justice Rubery: Police Justice Paul Rubery advised the board that the situation on Laurentian Drive is at the boiling point with both the Bolands and Lawrences patrolling roadway with guns, trees and limbs are cluttering the accessway on Kingsley property and the Vosburghs on the other corner are seething.

Aug. 30, 1971

- Penal Law :** Police Justice Rubery commented that on September 1st there will be new rulings in connection with the Penal Law which will entail the use of new forms by the police department and the local justice court. Motion was made by Trustee Alderman, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried to allow Justice Rubery to obtain the necessary forms.
- Court Clerk:** The board suggested that since no one had come forward to obtain the position of Court Clerk, an add could be inserted in the Timesaver and Palmyra Courier. Clerk was asked to take care of this.
- Side-walks:** The board talked informally relative to the possibility of replacing old sidewalks at village expense rather than a 50-50 arrangement as before. The walk in front of C. Richardson's on East Foster should be replaced to effectively take care of the water situation. This would mean raising the walk for quite some distance. Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Alderman and carried to replace this walk as soon as practicable.
- N.Y.S. Elec. & Gas:** Motion was made by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath and carried to grant the request of the N.Y.S. Electric & Gas to break the surface at 340 W. Foster, W. Foster & Stafford, 344 E. Foster and 416 Clairmont Park.
- Flag for Cemetery:** Caretaker W. Kaveny advised that if a flag were presented to the cemetery, he would see that it was raised and lowered daily. Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Green and carried to grant request.
- Pay Krugers:** Clerk informed the board that due to the death of Mrs. Kruger's father in Kentucky, it was necessary for both Mr. & Mrs. Kruger to attend. (Mrs. Kruger is the water cashier and biller and Mr. Kruger is assistant Water & Sewer Operator.) Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath, to pay both Mr. & Mrs. Kruger for the time they were gone.
- Clerk Conf. :** Motion by Trustee Sinclair, 2nd by Trustee Leysath, to allow the clerk to attend the annual conference of Clerks at Whiteface Mt. on Oct. 5th through 8th, funds having been appropriated in the budget.
- Adjourn:** Mayor Nussbaumer adjourned the meeting at 11:40 P.M.

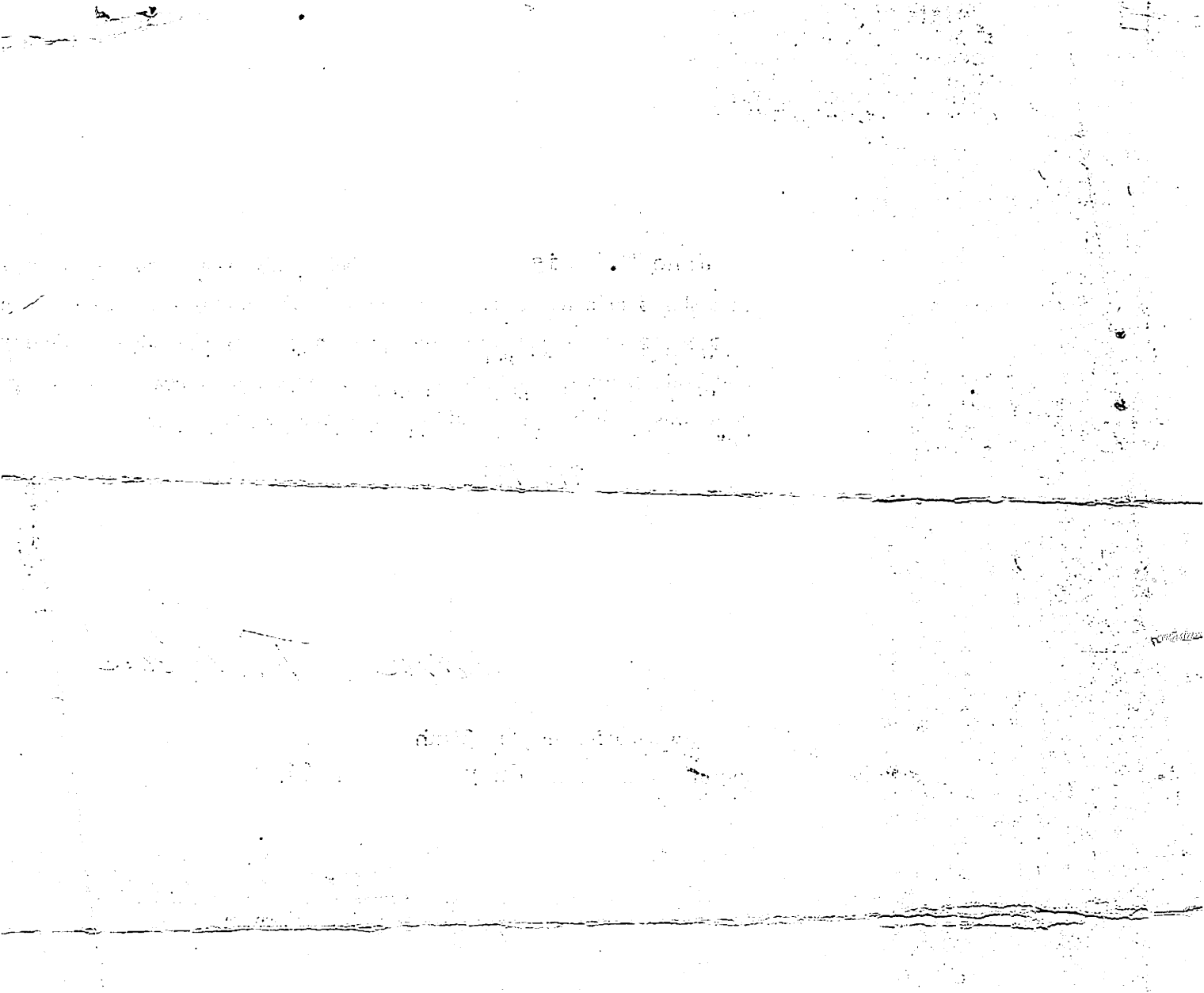
